Dear Parent / Caregiver Kia ora Koutou

The Ministry of Education has recently announced a review of the National Certificate of Educational Achievement. The review is exploring ideas and seeking feedback on how to strengthen NCEA as NZ's major school leaving qualification to make sure it works well for students, whanau, teachers and the wider community. Six opportunities in particular are at the forefront of the review:

- 1. Creating space at NCEA Level 1 for deeper learning. The suggestion is to make Level 1 a 40 credit qualification with two components: 20 credits focused on literacy and numeracy and 20 credits from a project.
- 2. Dismantling barriers to NCEA including fairer assessment conditions, removing entry fees and providing more teaching materials.
- Ensuring the Record of Achievement includes better information about students' capabilities and extracurricular interests. Family, employers or tertiary providers would be able to see clear information on a diverse range of achievements.
- 4. Strengthen literacy and numeracy: students, employers and tertiary providers can be confident that students who have achieved an NCEA qualification have the levels of literacy and numeracy needed to be successful in life. This includes digital, civic and financial literacy.
- 5. Ensuring NCEA Levels 2 and 3 support good connections beyond the classroom through self-directed projects, extracurricular activities, community work, work placement, industry training or employment.
- 6. Making it easier for teachers, schools and kura to refocus on quality teaching and learning and less on achieving as many credits as possible and reducing workload and stress for teachers and students alike.

There are several ways that students, teachers, families, whanau and the wider community can have a say. Go to: conversation.education.govt.nz. We will also be holding a parent forum in Term 3 for your feedback.

NCEA Fees and Financial Assistance

The *NCEA fee* for domestic student entry for all NCEA standards is \$76.70 per year. This fee is part of the HPC fees and needs to be paid to the College by *Wednesday 5 September 2018*. For students wanting to enter for Scholarship subjects, there is an additional fee of \$30.00 per subject.

For International Students the NCEA fee is \$383.30 per year and the additional cost per Scholarship entry is \$102.20.

Late fees will incur a penalty of \$50.00 if not paid by 1 December 2018.

Financial assistance is available to assist with the payment of entry fees for National Secondary Schools qualifications. The *purpose* of financial assistance is to ensure that fees are not a barrier to participation in national qualifications for domestic students. To be *eligible* to apply you must be the fee-payer and meet at least one of the following criteria:

- be currently receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit, or have a current Community Services Card (benefit-based applications)
- are not currently receiving a benefit, or do not have a current Community Services Card, but do have a joint family income that would entitle you to receive a Community Services Card (income-based applications)
- have two or more children who are candidates, irrespective of family income, and the total fees you would have to pay would otherwise be more than the \$200 multiple candidate maximum (multiple candidate applications).

You cannot claim financial assistance for international fee-paying students.

Application forms are available at the Student Centre or by using the electronic <u>Financial Assistance</u> form and either must be returned to the College by *Thursday 23 August 2018*.

NCEA Guide: Mobile App

To help parents and employers better understand NCEA, NZQA has developed an app designed for mobile devices - phones and tablets.

Called *NCEA Guide*, the app is for parents, whānau and employers and provides quick and easy access to key information about NCEA.

NCEA Guide includes key content about the structure of NCEA, how the qualification is used after studying, how credits work, and how endorsements are earned. Users can also choose to view the content in English or Te Reo.

Importantly, parents and whānau can also get information about how they can support family members studying towards gaining their secondary school qualification.

For employers, content focusses on what they can expect to see when job candidates show them documents detailing their qualifications and what they have studied.

The NCEA Guide App is free to download from the Apple App Store and Google Play Store

NCEA Student App

To help students plan their NCEA study programme, set goals and track their progress, NZQA developed the *NCEA Student* app.

NCEA Student gives students the ability to:

- select and set NCEA credit goals and targets
- see how they are tracking, including Literacy, Numeracy and University Entrance (UE)
- set Due Date reminders for when assignments are due
- capture results as their teachers hand back work
- use in English and Te Reo Māori
- and more ...

Support Services Overview:

It seems like now might be a good time to re-familiarize our school families with the support services available at Hauraki Plains College.

The school offers support to students in many ways in order to improve upon and maintain positive Hauora and thereby increase their learning capacity and fulfilment at school. The services at school are run in compliance with Ministry of Education Guidelines and Codes of Ethics regarding particular professional obligations. Thereby, some services are completely confidential services offered to the students.

The breakdown of services available at Hauraki Plains College include:

Doctor/Nurse Clinic:

Every Tuesday from 9am to 10:30am, we have Dr. Anthony Smit and Rose Marie Edlin (Public Health Nurse) running a health clinic. The service is free. Your student can be enrolled with a different doctor.

Sick Bay:

The School has a sick bay located at the Student Services Centre. Students, if unwell, can stay for a short period. If needed we ring home for carers to come and collect them from school.

School Counsellors:

The School has one full-time qualified counsellor/therapist Scott Henry. In addition, in 2018 we have two counsellor placement students Crystal Take and Sandy Snook. The counsellors can address most all counselling and mental health needs. If wanted Mr. Henry can assist with outside provider referrals.

Drug and Alcohol Counsellors:

The school has a qualified drug and alcohol counsellor present at the school every Friday. This is Aimee Bartlett. INTACT is the initiative, held under the umbrella of Te Korowai. Aimee can assist with cessation and education of alcohol and drug related issues. There are also youth workers available to assist students in their journey to making positive choices.

Dental Service:

A free mobile dental service is available which comes to HPC for a limited number of weeks each year. This is not intended to replace any existing preferred dental service which a family may have in place.

If you would like to have your student access one of the services or would like to learn, more about them feel free to contact Mr. Henry, School Counsellor.

Financial Assistance:

We encourage parents to use the Automatic Payment system to spread costs over the year. There is also <u>Financial Assistance</u> available to help families with NZQA fees (\$76.70 per year). Mr Dreyer is available to help with any financial assistance.

FROM THE CLASSROOM

THE SHOAH


This term in Year 10 Humanities we learnt about the Shoah also known as the Holocaust. Although the Holocaust and Shoah are talking about the same event, they have very different meanings. The Holocaust means destruction or slaughter on a mass scale, especially caused by fire; it also means a Jewish sacrificial offering which was burnt completely on an altar while the Shoah is a A Hebrew word meaning an catastrophe" Jewish people prefer the term Shoah even though the term Holocaust is more commonly known. The Holocaust is a historical event which took place between 30 Jan 1933 – 8 May 1945 in Nazi Germany. The Shoah was a mass genocide during WW2, aided by its collaborators who systematically murdered approximately six million European Jews.

The first topic we learnt about was "Life before the Holocaust/Shoah." It was important for us to learn about this to help get a deeper meaning of what the Jewish people had and what they had to lose. Then we learnt about anti-semitism and German propaganda and how quickly rumours can evolve into total social isolation. The Jews were used as scapegoats for centuries, a scapegoat being a person or persons who is blamed for the wrongdoings, mistakes, or faults of others. This can prove to be very bad when things get out of hand, as it did in the Holocaust and the years leading up to it. The next topic we learnt about was the ghettos. A ghetto is a restricted area in which a minority group is held. In this case, the minority group was the Jews, Ghettos were set up to segregate Jews from the rest of the population. They were designed to be temporary; some lasted only a few days or weeks, others for several years. The vast majority of ghetto inhabitants died from disease or starvation, were shot, or were deported to killing centres.


Next, we learnt about The Final Solution and the Jewish question. The Final Solution is the euphemistic term the Nazis used instead of saying "to annihilate all Jews". The Jewish question was Hitler's plan to get rid of all the Jews and finally, we learnt about the Jewish people 'Returning to Life and legacy'. Returning to life was the survivors rebuilding process, their do-over. Many survivors had to re-learn how to do the basic things we all take for granted; the children who survived had missed a huge chunk of their lives, it was stolen from them.

Overall we learnt how to become empathetic when studying this topic. This topic contained some very deep and powerful messages; it still makes us wonder how one person can cause that much harm. I felt that I am more aware of my words and how powerful they can be. It has confirmed to me that it is okay to be different and to definitely not "pass the blame", even if it's the easiest option or seems the only way to accept it. Don't make someone a 'scapegoat'. I really enjoyed learning about this topic, even though I am yet to completely comprehend how someone could go through with such an awful experience.
