

Dear Parent / Caregiver *Kia ora Koutou*

Our term two theme is *Our Place: Kaitiakitanga* in which we look at how and why we do things at HPC and in particular, the Hauraki Way - a basic code of conduct to ensure a safe environment for learning to happen.

Confirmed results from 2018 NCEA are now available on the NZQA website. We are really satisfied with these results as NZQA now include all students who are on the roll for more than 70 days including those who have left before completing their NCEA qualification for an apprenticeship or employment. The graphs show HPC results compared with national averages.



We are working on three targets for 2019:

- **Equity Challenge**: Reduce the gap between Boys and Girls / Māori and non Māori to less than 5 GPA points in the Junior Diploma
- Excellence Challenge: Improve external assessment (exam) participation and endorsements in NCEA by 5%
- **Wellbeing Challenge**: Achieve a 10% positive shift in five aspects of student wellbeing. The five aspects have been identified through a student wellbeing survey taken last year including clarity around expectations, student identity and agency, sense of fairness and support for managing emotions.

Health Programme Review

The school is required to consult with parents and whanau about our Health programme which is part of the Hauora (Health and PE) Hub at Years 9 and 10.

At Year 9 the programme focuses on positive wellbeing:

- Understanding a Maori worldview
- Setting goals to achieve positive wellbeing
- Developing interpersonal skills
- Demonstrating positive communication to resolve conflict and to enhance relationships
- Developing an action plan for Year 9 camp

At Year 10:

- Analysing health issues associated with a lack of physical activity
- Describing the impacts of unhealthy substance abuse and use communication strategies to resolve interpersonal conflict
- Understanding positive sexuality and promoting wellbeing (a letter will come home later in Term 2 giving more detail of this unit of work)
- Positive attitudes and camp planning (NCEA Level 1 Hauora assessment)

In addition to the Health programme at junior level and Health courses at senior level, our River programme covers a number of wellbeing issues including time management, managing anxiety and managing emotions.

Subject Teacher Interviews

Senior students will receive a report on their progress in NCEA courses next Wednesday. Parents and whanau will be able to see what standards have been achieved and those in progress.

These will take place on Thursday, 30 May (4-8pm) and Friday, May 31 (9am-3pm). Junior students will come home with an appointment slip on Friday, 17 May when the booking site will go live. Senior students will receive one with their reports on Wednesday 22 May. To book times with subject teachers: www.schoolinterviews.co.nz (Code: wyat8).

Buses will run as normal on the Friday although students are not required to attend school (unless they have a subject interview). Students who do attend school will be supervised.

Board Elections:

Nominations for standing for the Board of Trustees is now open and closes on Friday, 24 May. All nominations to be sent to the Returning Officer (Carolyn Purcell) at HPC by this date with a Candidate Statement. Boards need a balance of skills and experiences around the table to ensure effective processes for planning, monitoring, reporting and reviewing of the school's performance. Industrial Action:

As the media has indicated, teachers belonging to the NZEI and PPTA (primary and secondary teachers union) have indicated that they will be taking industrial action on Wednesday 29 May. The college will be closed for teaching on that day, but supervision is offered for students who come to school. Buses will not be running.

NCEA: It remains to be seen what the recently published NCEA Change Package Overview will mean for schools. The key proposed changes are:

- Make NCEA more accessible through no fees and standards for students with learning support needs
- Integrate te ao Maori and matauranga Maori into the NCEA outcome statements
- Strengthen Literacy and Numeracy requirements
- Have fewer, larger standards
- Simplify the NCEA structure so each level requires 60 credits with a maximum of 120 credits for Levels 1 and 3; 100 for Level 3 and resubmissions only for Not Achieved to Achieved grades. Rebalance the number of credits for internally and externally assessed to a 50:50 split
- Create a graduate profile for each level of NCEA to show clearer pathways to further education and employment
- Keep NCEA Level 1 as optional

The changes will be worked through over the next four years; our priority is to ensure the revised NCEA qualifications work for all learners, regardless of whether they are intending to go to university, a trade or full time employment.
