Team Tonga

Over the recent break, a group of 28 students and staff headed to a warm welcome from Vaini Government School in the Kingdom of Tonga where they spent several days supporting and providing activities such as sports, science, drama and first aid for the young students there. This is the second time that HPC has been involved in the initiative organised by Head of Humanities, Mrs Miriam Courtney.

Said Year 13 student Caitlin Doddrell about the experience:

When we first arrived at the school I was immediately shocked and already very emotional. Before leaving for this trip I was told that they had very little but it wasn't until I got to the school that I realised what very little actually looked like from our perspective. The school consisted of two buildings with about three-four classes in each block. Some classes had no furniture such as desks and tables. There were holes in some walls and doors, even in the floors. The kids were all so giving, loving and precious. They brought so much joy and happiness to us all and I hope we made an impact on their lives as well. These kids really made me realise that there is much more to life than technology, being rich and having everything right there when you need it. I have taken away that being happy and having friendships is far more important than having everything you want.

The group also took with them resources such as sports equipment, stationery and chrome books for teachers. HPC currently have two staff whose families originated from the village of Vaini: Mr Siosaia Pomana and Mr Timote Mapuhola.

With numerous delays for the start date, we were pleased early in *March* to see the driving of the first test piles for the new six classroom build. Thorburn Builders have been outstanding with their management and the building process. They are confident that the planned hand-over of the building to the school in September will still be achievable. While there has been some inconvenience around the school during this process, it doesn't seem to have affected how our students are learning and the results they are achieving.

Semester One is now well behind us and HPC students are generally doing well with their learning, with good progress seen across the year groups. We understand that there are different levels of learning and sometimes the measured achievement we see in statistics is less powerful than the measure of the engagement we see in the individuals. For improvement to be catered for at all levels to everyone at HPC, we have to plan and prepare.

A Strategic Direction process helps focus the groundwork required to be able to do this and keep on task. We will be holding a full community consultation meeting this term regarding HPC's Strategic Direction and request input from all of the community. The date for this is set for Tuesday 17 September 7pm in the college hall. More information will come out in our weekly e-bulletins closer to the date.

College Icon Passes

The recent passing of former Assistant Principal (Head Mistress), Mrs Vee Port was recognised at a recent student assembly in acknowledgement of her thirty one years of teaching and leadership service to Hauraki Plains College.

Raised and educated in Timaru, Vee went on to gain her Masters in English at Canterbury University with Latin and French as her other main subjects. Her first teaching post was at Christchurch Technical College, before starting at HPC in 1965, having recently married the college's First Assistant, Mr Fred Port. At that time it was a 15 strong teaching staff led by Principal, Mr J W Allen.

In 1968 Mrs Port was prevailed upon to take the position of Senior Assistant Mistress, a role she continued in until her retirement in 1995. In this role her consistency and fairness ensured the respect of the staff and pupils alike. Outside the classroom she worked tirelessly for the Maori Culture Group, as well as giving time to basketball (now netball), softball, coaching the school debating teams, fund raising efforts and the equestrian team which was a particular interest.

Said former colleague and good friend Miss Lorraine Hayward at Mrs Port's funeral on behalf of many who knew Vee: "Our sincere sadness at Vee's passing. Her friendship, scholarship and her way of making students believe they could succeed was truly inspirational. A local legend in her own right."


