Farewell Mrs Harris



This year we farewell Principal Ngaire Harris who is stepping down as Principal at the end of this year after 21 years in the role.

Mrs Harris (nee Mapson) was born in a family of seven children and grew up on a farm on the Plains. She attended Ngatea Primary and then started as a third former at HPC in 1968. After college, while completing a degree at Waikato University she married Greg, also an ex student and farmed at Kaihere where they brought up their four children: Daniel, Hannah, Jessie and Sam.

It was during these years that she began tutoring local students in Maths. The Deputy Principal, Norman Pratt, of the time heard about it and asked her to fill a teaching shortage at HPC. At the time Mrs Harris was not a trained teacher so it was a big move to go from the cowshed to the classroom. Mr Pratt literally turned up at the cowshed one morning and said he wasn't moving until she got out of her overalls and gave it a go!

Mrs Harris joined the staff full time from 1988 teaching both History and Maths when Norman Pratt was promoted to Principal. Since that time, she has been in pretty much every role from student, parent, grandparent, teacher, Dean, Head of Department, Deputy Principal, and then Principal from 2002. Continuing her own learning, Mrs Harris completed a Masters in Educational Leadership with first class honours in 2004.

Mrs Harris reflects on her time at HPC: "It is a sobering thought that I became Principal before current students were born. It has been so much more difficult for me to step away from this role than what it was ever to be appointed to it in the first place. I have never ever thought of it as going to work, only going to school and that is a very different thing at least in my head.

"I take with me many priceless and enduring memories: Special and ordinary moments on the sidelines at a sporting event; a stunning or brave performance at a unplugged concert; and seeing the confidence and pride when a student is walking out of our gates for the last time with what they need to do well in their future lives.

Alongside this, there have been times when it is one hard thing followed by another hard thing and yet more hard things which have been brutal and left permanent scars on the heart. Over my time at HPC, there has been so much learning about life and leadership. These come to mind:

- Nothing great or worthwhile is easily won. The value you place on something is what you are prepared to give up for it. You have to be prepared to pay the price.
- It is a battle so don't pack a picnic basket. Maybe life isn't about avoiding the bruises. Maybe it's about collecting the scars to prove you showed up for it.
- Don't go too far in front of your people, they will mistake you for

the enemy. If you don't carry the ball, you can't lead the team.

- We will never get to our destination if we stop for every barking dog. Whatever you do, someone will think you are wrong. Project courage. Hold your nerve.
- The standard we walk past is the standard we accept. We therefore have to sweat the small stuff. Uniforms matter, since kids tend to behave how they are dressed. Manners too are important. They open doors that the best education will not.
- Blowing out someone else's candle doesn't make yours shine brighter.
- Courage does not always roar. Sometimes it is the quiet voice at the end of the day that says I will try again tomorrow. And on those days, simply turning up is a victory.
- Old school is the new cool. In an unpredictable, complex and rapidly changing world, our young people need the security and safety of boundaries. A lack of boundaries encourages a lack of respect. The further away we move from those old school values, the more unstable our society becomes.
- *Each for all.* As long as we stay true to our motto, HPC will continue in it's tradition of excellence.

And this one sits on my desk as a daily reminder of what it's about: Be the kind of woman when your feet hit the floor each morning, the devil says oh heck - she's up. My attitude has always been to do what ever it takes. I know that when it comes my time to give an account of my work here to the Almighty - mistakes and all - that I will be able to say I've done my best work and become my best self at HPC. In the end, that's all that matters.

I have worked hard for our young people, loved this school and have been fiercely committed to it and simply wish HPC well for its future."

At the end of this year, we farewell **Mrs Miriam Courtney** who is currently Head of Humanities. Miriam is a past student attending HPC in 1990 - 1994 growing up in Kerepehi as a real 'farm girl'. She went on to Auckland University completing a B Science, majoring in Geography before completing her teaching Diploma. After teaching at Thames High, Mrs Courtney started at HPC in 2007 and winning the Head of Social Science position in 2015. Some of the highlights of her time at HPC include Tongariro field trips and leading the volunteer service group to Tonga in 2013 when she was Dean. Under Mrs Courtney, a number of new social science subjects have been added including Legal Studies, Classical Studies and Psychology. More recently, significant changes are happening in the Social Sciences under the ministry's Curriculum Refresh and Mrs Courtney has been at the forefront of this. We wish her all the best in her new role at St Peters, Cambridge.

Also leaving is **Miss Sophia Wang** (Mathematics) who has been at HPC for two years and in that time gained full registration. Miss Wang is taking up a position at St Kentigern's Auckland.

Leaving a Legacy

Three community members were honoured at the recent sports prizegiving. The HPC No 1 rugby field is to be called the **'The Norman Pratt Field'** in recognition of Mr Pratt's outstanding contribution to HPC Rugby. This is a new initiative by the Board of Trustees to honour those who have given outstanding service to the school. Mr Pratt coached the First XV during the 80s and 90s and his particular achievement was winning the Thames Valley Secondary Schools Coulter Cup competition no less than 12 years in a row. This we believe is still a NZ provincial record.

Mike Cotter was honoured also with a HPC Community Contribution. Mr Cotter received the award for services to Cricket. Over the past 14 years, Mike has rebuilt HPC Cricket from the ground up, coaching several times a week, sorting out equipment, writing up games for the local paper and advocating for the sport. In 2022, HPC fielded four cricket teams. As one cricketer commented: "Mr Cotter is tough but fair and he knows his stuff!"

Malcolm Cross was also awarded an HPC Community Contribution award for Basketball. Malcolm has been the backbone of HPC Basketball for no less than 17 years. He began coaching basketball in 2004 and since then has coached no less than 28 teams, one season coaching three teams. Malcolm's wife Leigh has also been a huge support for HPC basketball, herself coaching five senior girls teams. Together they organised three trips to USA and Canada, creating lifetime memories for those fortunate enough to be part of them.

The story behind the Lynne Penrhys-Evans Memorial Award for School DUX

Lynne Penrhys-Evans attended HPC from 1968 to 1972 and was Head Girl in her final year. Lynne attended Waikato University to complete a Bachelor of Social Sciences. She died tragically from a heart condition on her wedding day, as she returned from the hair dressers.

Lynne's mother Ethel Penrhys-Evans served on the Board of Governors and husband Julian was a great supporter of the college attending every event, big and small, for children Lynne, Sandra and Russell and then grandchildren Kylie, Brooke and Rachel who also attended HPC, Rachel being Head Girl in 2008.

Was the theme for the 2022 Hauraki Festival which was held in Te Aroha at the Te Aroha Events Centre. He mihi hohonu ki te hau kāinga te marae o Paeahi. Whakanuia ki a koutou.

Ko Tohora te waka Ko Tikapa te moana Ko Te Aroha ki uta, ko Moehau ki tai Ko Pukemokemoke kei waenganui Ko Waihou te awa Ko Waitoki te whenua Ko Paeahi te marae Ko Ngati Paeahi te hapu Ko Hirawani te Tangata

The kaupapa was to bring back the mauri (lifeforce) to our whenua, our marae, our kura and the people of Hauraki. After the disruptions and the challenges brought along by Covid and the stress placed on whānau and communities this was a breath of fresh air (Te Hā).

Also our own kaupapa was to carry our taonga Coral-Lee with us on stage and to dedicate our performance to her. Takoto mai e te kotiro kua wheturangitia i te korowai o Ranginui. Arohanui ki a koe i nga wā katoa.

Edwin Gray Townshend (1925 - 2022)



Edwin Gray Townshend

The recent passing of Mr Gray Townshend signalled the end of an era for the Townshend family.

Gray Townshend was born in 1929 to Charlie and Margaret Townshend who farmed at Netherton. He attended Netherton Primary and won a scholarship to attend Kings College in Auckland. This was only one of two scholarships offered from an area extending to the Far North and the Waikato. As a student, Gray was quite an academic, studying 7 subjects for School Certificate

including French, Latin, Hebrew, Greek, Maths, Science and English. He passed two of these with 100%!.

After schooling, Gray returned to the home farm on Pukahu Road. At the age of 21 he bought an engagement ring and 48 acres in the same week, marrying Marie Thomas in 1952, with whom he spent 65 years of marriage together before Marie's passing. The couple had three children: Ross, Mark and Gary.

Over his 93 years, Gray spent approximately 30 years on the farm at Netherton, 30 years in the homestead on Bush Road and then the final 30 years in Ngatea township. Gray was big on three things: family, his work and community.

The list of community organisations that Gray was part of is both expansive and impressive reflecting a range of interests: farming, faith, politics, education and service interests. His great community love was the Lions Club, of which he was part of for more than 50 years, earning him an International service badge and life membership. Gray was also a committed member of a number of Masonic lodges including the Hauraki Plains Masonic Lodge from 1959 to 2017. He was a member of the National Party for 70 years and other organisations he served on include: Young Farmers Club; Federated Farmers; the local Drainage Board, Hauraki A & P Association; the Hauraki Plains Union Parish board; Senior Net, the Netherton Hall committee, Ngatea Scouts; the Plains Historical society, Positively Promoting the Plains and Probus.

Gray's keen interest in education saw him serve on the Ngatea School committee and the Hauraki Plains College Association. Gray and Marie were early and generous contributors to the Haurakian Charitable Trust and while his family would say he was not into sports, he nevertheless served in various clubs including tennis, swimming, rowing and hockey.

During Gray's 40 year career as a Valuer, he covered a broad range of property types from industrial to commercial to residential. The Fellowship of New Zealand Institute of Valuers noted that "Gray served the community he lived in with distinction and the valuation professional an enviable reputation."

Son Mark recalls Gray's mother telling them that Gray, as a child, never complained. To his last day, whenever he was asked, 'How are you?", he would respond with either "I have no reason to complain" or "Upright and solvent.!

Gray Townshend was a man who thought globally, represented nationally and acted locally and through his outstanding community contributions, his legacy will continue to impact on the local community for many years to come. He is survived by his three sons, nine grandchildren and ten great grandchildren who will ensure his memory and legacy lives on.

He arrived in Ngatea around the mid 1920s being originally from Devonshire, England. Although in his 80s, Samuel Harris was caretaker of both the Ngatea School and the Public Hall. As such, he is possibly the school's earliest caretaker. He died at 92 years of age in October 1938. His obituary in the Thames Star noted, "Mr Harris is survived by his wife and two daughters. There are five greatgrandchildren and three great-greatgrandchildren. The funeral which took place this morning, was largely attended."
