NCEA Evening

Thank you to the 30 students and whānau who were able to attend our NCEA evening on Thursday 16 February. We were able to share how NCEA works, and update you on the changes coming. Here is a <u>link</u> to our presentation, the 5 minute video is on slide 3. It was great having our academic students running part of the evening and giving their perspectives on NCEA and top tips!

Changes to NCEA - especially Literacy and Numeracy

As mentioned in the bulletin last week, there are major changes coming for NCEA:

- From 2024 students will need to pass a reading, writing and maths exam (marked by someone outside of school) in order to gain their literacy and numeracy credits for NCEA. Here are the assessments from June 2022 that schools involved in the pilots used:
 - Reading
 - Writing
 - Numeracy
- Hauraki Plains College will be taking part in the voluntary pilots for 2023, to help us prepare for them being mandated in 2024
- In 2021, the national average pass rate for the pilot was 34.5% in writing, 66.9% in reading and 65.3% in numeracy
- There is also a completely <u>new curriculum coming</u> in 2026. The current curriculum has existed since 2007.

The majority of our professional learning with teachers this year will be on upskilling in literacy and numeracy teaching across the curriculum. This is not just the job of the Math and English teachers - it is everyone's business.

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Demerit Points - final reminder

The Sports Executive would like to inform and remind parents that we will continue to use the demerit points system when it comes to representing our school in sports and activity teams. It is important to us that students are doing the right things within their classes and our school, to then be representing school in their chosen codes. The process will come into effect from the start of Week 3 (Monday 13 February).

Please take note of the following:

- Once a student reaches 5 demerit points, the Sports Executive will send a warning letter home
- On reaching 10 demerit points, a single event stand down letter will be sent home
- Every 10 demerits from here on will constitute another single event stand down

Coaches/Managers/Organisers/TICs will be notified by the Sports Executive in order to put processes in place to accommodate the stand down. Once a stand down has been completed 10 demerit points will be removed from the student's total, which means students can work back to zero. Every great school has another great school down the road

The Hauraki Kāhui Ako is a collaborative group of educational providers in the Hauraki region that strives to enhance learning outcomes for all students. Currently, we are seeking support from individual school and kura communities who are willing to contribute to a specific community in the Hawke's Bay region that has been severely impacted by recent floods.

Last year, some teachers from our kāhui ako visited Henry Hill School to witness firsthand their implementation of a broad range of trauma-informed practices and initiatives. The school's principal, Jase Williams, generously shared his knowledge and resources, which have played a pivotal role in developing trauma-informed practices across our kāhui ako. Jase will also be a keynote speaker at our upcoming Trauma-Informed Practice Conference, which is scheduled to be held next term.

Another reason for our focus on supporting this particular community is that the school and a large portion of the surrounding community had experienced flooding about four years ago. Given that a large water stream flows through the community and behind the school, the recent damage caused by Cyclone Gabrielle has been significantly greater.

We strongly encourage school and kura communities to join us in supporting this community in the Hawke's Bay region. Together, we can make a meaningful impact and help those who have been severely impacted by recent natural disasters.
