"On the first day of Term 4 I found out that, what I thought was a swimming injury, was actually a very aggressive Osteosarcoma. In that short time, I have had a rare forequarter amputation of my right arm and shoulder to save my life! I have recovered well from surgery and restarted chemo which will last until May 2024.



While life changing, I have not let my diagnosis get me down and I am still planning to get back in the pool when well enough to keep working towards my goal of going to the 2028 Olympics in swimming. I would like to thank everyone for their support and best wishes." Rylee Sayer.



# **Mathematics**



This Semester our Year 13 Maths class has been exploring two important topics - Statistics and Systems of Equations, all under the guidance of Mrs Casey. Despite the commonness of technology in modern classrooms, Mrs. Casey takes an "old-school" approach to teaching, favouring the classic pen-and-paper and Q & A methods. While acknowledging the benefits of technology, we've found that this traditional approach has its own set of advantages, particularly when it comes to mathematical learning. It is useful in that it helps us grasp and retain concepts in Mathematics, as the act of writing reinforces our understanding. This term witnessed our Year 9 students once again embarking on a compelling journey into persuasive speech writing. This unit equipped them with the invaluable skill of crafting persuasive arguments and fostering effective communication and critical thinking. Beyond mastering the art of rhetoric, students gained the ability to articulate their thoughts with conviction—an essential

skill for success in academics and beyond.

Simultaneously, our Year 10's engaged in an exploration of short stories. Through study and analysis, students delved into the intricacies and value of storytelling, unpacking narrative techniques and unravelling the layers of meaning within various short stories. It is our hope that this cultivated a deeper appreciation for the art of storytelling, nurturing critical thinking and literary insight.

Term 4 is always a flurry of activity for the Seniors too with some preparing for exams and others completing the last assessments to show off their learning for the Semester. A huge congratulations needs to go out to all Senior English students for their continued mahi and dedication to their learning.

As a department, we are excited to move forward into 2024: new courses, new contexts and new opportunities await us all.

# Foundation Studies

Terms 3 and 4 have seen our Foundation Studies students getting stuck into some Geometry and Measurement in Maths. Our Year 9 students took up the challenge of designing a swimming pool for HPC. Students gathered measurements, drew designs and crafted models of their pools from a range of materials. Students are hoping to see some of their designs come to fruition for future students to enjoy! Year 10 students have been introduced to the world of Pythagoras and Trigonometry. Learning the meaning of SOHCAHTOA and calculating unknown side lengths and angles. This learning will stand them in good stead for the challenges of Year 11 Mathematics in 2024.

Term 4 is "Pick and Mix" time in Hauora. Our students have enjoyed the opportunity to select their favourite physical activities and work alongside students from other Year 9 and 10 P.E classes. We are grateful to the P.E department for working with our students and encouraging them to take up the challenge of regular physical activity for health and wellbeing.

The writing focus for this term continues to be on crafting paragraphs in a non-fiction context and playing with sentence structure. Students have had the opportunity to play with multiple sentence structures including listing, 'ing' starts and adverbial starts in a range of different pieces of writing. They have also been developing their ability to write for a purpose and have looked at this in different contexts such as learning how to make an origami frog and then writing their own instructions for a 6 - 8 year old to follow. Students should be proud of the work they are putting in and the success they are yielding as a result.

Year 10 Science students have completed unit topics in physical forces, robotics and an introduction to genetics. Forces saw students measuring and calculating forces in various real-life situations, including determining whether cars speed past the school grounds (they do not)! Students also took part in the school's annual Science Fair where they used the scientific process to chose a topic of interest, ask a question they wanted to answer e.g. "What kinds of materials will protect you from a slug gun?", and then complete an investigation to answer their question.





# Science > >

The weather has warmed up and with the arrival of some sunshine, students have been able to get out and about and apply their knowledge in real world contexts. Mr Angell took a class of students to walk a short distance along the Hapuakohe Walkway where they observed and discussed ecological concepts like stratification in trees and why plants closer to the ground have leaves larger than trees higher up in the canopy and have developed ways of capturing and funneling water.

While hands-on activities are always enjoyed by teachers and students alike, Term 4 is a great term for engaging in projects that extend over more than a week. Ms. Penney's Year 10 class has been investigating forces and the students are constructing a range of models to demonstrate balanced and unbalanced

forces. Ms. Isbister's Year 9 class has enjoyed learning about human body systems, in particular identifying parts of a mammal heart during a dissection, and Ms. Clelland's Year 9 class has been investigating what materials make effective heat insulators. Mr. Willcock's Year 10 class has been learning about robotics and how to program an mBot robot to execute simple manoeuvres. The staff have enjoyed seeing the robots whizzing up and down and around the Tech block hallway.

Kahoot! quizzes are a fun way to review a day or week's learning. The students get super competitive as they review their score after every question and see who is in the lead. Medals and a podium photo allow the winners to celebrate their success.

Year 10 Science Fair winners were presented with their certificates during the Year 10 Prizegiving.



# **Humanities**

For the third year in a row, HPC has a winner for the Paul Seideman Scholarship run by the Holocaust Centre of New Zealand. Holocaust survivor Paul Seideman was a great supporter of Holocaust education and remembrance in Aotearoa New Zealand.

As a young Czech Jew, Paul managed to survive the Lodz Ghetto, several concentration and labour camps, including Auschwitz, and a death march, during World War II. He was liberated at Dachau, aged 17. After liberation, Paul emigrated to Australia, and then New Zealand. Sadly Paul's mother and father died in the Lodz Ghetto, in 1941 and 1942 respectively.

To commemorate the 70th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau by the Soviet Army on 27 January 1945, and to encourage students in Aotearoa New Zealand to engage in Holocaust studies. Paul funded an annual Holocaust essay competition for secondary students, administered by the Holocaust Centre of New Zealand. Paul passed away in 2021.

This year, Year 11 student, Olivia Cammell won the Year 11 - 13 section of the Paul Seidmann Scholarship by creating this amazing artwork to answer the following prompt:

"Nearly 80 years after the end of World War II and the Holocaust, we are quickly reaching a point where first-person accounts of the events surrounding this horrific time in history, will be gone. With ever-increasing reports of rising antisemitism worldwide and in Aotearoa New Zealand, many question how Holocaust education will change when the last survivors pass. Examine the way in which the loss of the first-generation survivors will impact Holocaust education".

Olivia's prize includes: Return flights to Wellington for the student and one guardian, overnight hotel accommodation in Wellington, \$500 scholarship and a framed certificate.

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# **Primary Industries**


This term we have seen much warmer weather that has enabled us to get our Year 10 Ag/Hort class outside and into our gardens.


## **Business Studies**

The Tyred Dogz team was also given the opportunity to do a second pitch at the Wild Card presentations as they were the team that got the highest points across the four challenges completed during the year.

The Year 11 Enterprise Studies ran a very successful food market. Four teams sold delicious products and two of the teams were able to get sponsorships from Silver Fern Farms and Ingham's Chicken.

The focus of this term has been to prepare for the year end external exams and develop the new Year 11 Commerce course which will be taught next year.
