TRISH SMITH 40YR SERVICE

On the 1st of March 1984, Trish Smith joined the staff at Hauraki Plains College. Recently we celebrated her 40 years of service!!!! Trish began as the staffroom 'tea-lady', as well as working in the stationery shop. The 40 years saw Trish undertake many different roles including Teacher Aide, ESOL support, International Student Coordinator and more recently the Arts Coordinator.

In her role with international students, Trish became the 'other mum' for both students and their homestay families and was on call 24/7 to help. Through this experience Trish learned that teenagers, no matter their culture, generally all experience the different challenges that come with being a teenager!

Supporting the Arts has been a huge passion for Trish. This includes Dance, Drama, Music and the Visual Arts. Trish believes that the Arts are an integral part of society that is often overlooked. She has made it her mission to open students' eyes to the opportunities provided by the Arts. Trish loves school musical productions, particularly light and sound technology - she continues to learn and pass on her knowledge to the students lucky to work alongside her.

Trish has served beyond the gates of Hauraki Plains College and into our community. She is known as the 'Arts Support' by those in local schools and in organisations that she works with. Trish has supported many events including concerts, school shows, weddings, and funerals.

Trish has several special memories across her 40 years that shine bright:

- The Magical Mystery Tours these were trips to Northland, the Hawkes Bay, Taranaki and the Bay of Plenty for 60 students and 10 adults, with Pete from Murphys as the driver!
- Working in the old prefabs to the purpose built music suite in 2007/2008 and the launch of the HPC RECORDS label with their first CD release and concert of the album "Debut".
- The 2012 College Centenary Reunion a special event on so many fronts, including working with a team of students on the technology for the event.
- Working as the liaison for the annual Hauraki District Council Sister City Exchange with the Jiading Area of Shanghai, China. Trish was able to participate herself and it was an experience she will never forget.
- Being the daughter of a returned servicemen, ANZAC day has always been memorable for Trish and she has regularly helped with light and sound for the school dawn services. Trish also helped source the resources used to build the ANZAC garden mural.

Trish has seen a lot of change in HPC across the 40 years. The school role has doubled, with new buildings, uniform changes and new staff. In 1992 Trish recalls the change from 2 Hapu (Aotea and Tainui) to 4 Hapu and the new designs introduced by Stacey Latham for Tikapa, Ohinemuri, Piako and Waihou still going strong!

We are very grateful to have had Trish working at Hauraki Plains College for an incredible 40 years.

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE



Welcome to 2024! It's been a pleasure experiencing a full year as tumuaki in 2023, and I'm feeling excited about the year ahead together. I purposely use the word 'together.' The power of the collective is very strong. Most of us will have heard the old saying, "the whole is greater than the sum of its parts," to describe synergy.

Education has picked up a term that connects to synergy - that of Collective Efficacy (CE). In the context of teachers and schools, it is the idea that the effort of all of us together will have a positive effect on students. CE is the collective belief of teachers in their ability to positively affect students. When teams of educators believe they have the ability to make a difference, exciting things can happen in a school.

We are spoiled for choice when looking at successful teams at HPC. I am proud of our widening senior leadership team who have picked up key portfolios across our school. Our Deans are working very hard to ensure the Hauraki Way is being upheld so all students can learn in their classes. The additional Deans have been positively received by the families and students they support. There are some new additions to our curriculum leader team, a group who are positive, innovative, with a sharp focus on learning, who lead their departments through uncertain times while we wait for our national office to communicate the new education priorities. Our five head students are doing a wonderful job being role models for our school while leading teams of students across their respective councils. I could go on!

CE extends beyond the staff at HPC. I maintain that the community's belief in our school impacts the success of our students. I offer huge thanks and appreciation to the businesses and individuals who have connected our students to work placements and Gateway, and those who have helped classes through Do Day - our new end-of-term special initiative to connect learning in subjects closer to careers and the 'real world. I especially thank the Hauraki Charitable Trust for their continual support of our school - we are very excited about the No.11 Orchard Road Project and the future positive impact for us at school. It was wonderful to host the Townshend Thomas Charitable Community Trust (TTCCT) for a school tour led by our Year 13's this term, and to reconnect with ex-students who continue to be passionate about investing and supporting our school and community.

Finally, I acknowledge the hard mahi done by our Primary school teachers. Our wonderful Year 9's arrived prepared for College at the start of February (all 205 of them!), full of enthusiasm and a love of learning. It is a real privilege to continue their learning journey, one that you have already invested so much in.

It's been a busy start to the school year. There has been plenty of action both inside the classroom and out. The roll is healthy at 900, and we have a large cohort of Year 9 students who have adjusted well to College life. We have a larger senior leadership team with four deputy principals championing key portfolios. We also have a few extra Deans at Year 9, 10 and 11 to increase the pastoral support for students. We are looking to recruit more teacher aides. A warm welcome to the new teachers at HPC this year.

Congratulations to our 2023 students for their NCEA achievements. It was great to see NCEA Level 2 being over 94%, as this is a baseline qualification that gets students into courses outside of school, and sets them up for more success with Level 3. We have record numbers of students doing Gateway and Work Experience this year, and some good connections with employers coming in to talk to classes at the end of term Do Days.

There has been plenty of success on the sports

fields in the summer codes with a few big events still to come. Great to see some winter codes have started their preparations already. As always if you feel there is a clash in your students' commitments please contact the school and let them know.

The school is currently looking into how best to further develop the Hayward Farm, to maximise the agricultural learning opportunities this farm presents.

A lot of maintenance and alterations have been done to some of our school houses. Also on the property front a lot of planning has gone into the schools long term building maintenance plan. Starting this year a lot of the roofs will be replaced.

Mrs Moller is sending out a survey to the parents at the end of each term and sharing key themes with the Board. Remember the school welcomes feedback and is more than happy to answer any questions either by a phone call or email.

Our Place: Our Stories

Our school acknowledges a heritage grounded in two founding stories - that of Hako, the ancestor of the Tangata Whenua, who travelled up the Piako River on a whale and that of the European pioneers who transformed the Piako swampland into the Hauraki Plains.

We first began as Orchard School when in 1912, fifteen young pupils, met for three days each week in a borrowed Lands and Survey Hut. Two years later, the first classroom, nicknamed 'The Dog Box' was built. From 1918 further class rooms were built and a secondary department was established and Orchard School was renamed Ngatea District High School.

When Ngatea Primary was opened, the intention was to close down the school, but through the determination and resilience of local parents, Hauraki Plains College was officially established in 1963. From these humble beginnings, our students come from the wider Hauraki area

I also have a wonderful Year 12 River group, and look after the Year 12 cohort working with the Year 12 Dean Mrs Paton. MRS ALISSA PLACE

I have the pleasure of supporting the Year 10 co-hort and the English and Math departments. I also serve as a mentor for the English department. One of my main portfolios is pastoral care, specifically student wellbeing. This is a portfolio that is close to my heart and my goal is to make sure that students who attend Hauraki Plains College feel safe, valued and like they belong.

HPC has made wellbeing a top priority this year. Our goal is to increase student wellbeing by 10% according to our strategic plan. To understand where our students stand, we've been surveying students using the WHO's five questions about wellbeing. The results highlighted a need for more support for students facing challenges.

Fortunately, we've expanded our wellbeing team, which now includes a full-time social worker, guidance counsellor, school nurse, student centre staff, and monthly visits from a community doctor. Additionally, we're collaborating with outside agencies like Ngā Waitāpara a Rangatahi, who run the Kauri Tree program aimed at boosting confidence, self-expression, and self-awareness in our youth and Family Saftey Services who are running a Year 12 Healthy Relationships course. We are also encouraging families to join our support network at school by joining Deans and staff in creating support plans for students who need further support.

I have been on the Senior Leadership Team since 2012. I am currently teaching a combined Year 12 and Year 13 Geography class. I also have the privilege of being the River Guide of a lovely group of Year 9 students. I work very closely in a supporting role with the two Year 9 Deans to assist them in managing any Year 9 issues, both positive and not-so-positive.

My main responsibilities are administrative in nature. My main role is Principal's Nominee, which means I am responsible for quality assurance, reporting, ensuring integrity and authenticity, key communications with NZQA on behalf of the school and candidates, external moderation, breaches and assessment policies and processes, and smooth running of external examinations and assessments. The most important thing currently on our radar is getting students in mainly Years 10 and 11, ready to sit and achieve the co-requisite assessments for Literacy (Reading and Writing) and Numeracy. Some of my other roles are coordinating EOTC applications, Health and Safety, reporting, attendance and Sports Prize Giving.

MR JONATHAN O'NEILL

This year I am championing the portfolios of senior curriculum, innovation, and careers/ pathways. It has been exciting to develop the Learning Lab strand of our curriculum. We will also be talking to our community later this year about a staggered roll out of BYOD. I have also been supporting Year 11 teachers to create courses which combine subject areas - to make learning more real world, and to give students

access to more subjects through their 6 line timetable.

A 75-min block after lunch on Fridays has been allocated to 'Learning Labs'; high-interest elective classes run by teachers. These classes provide learning opportunities beyond the traditional curriculum. Students choose one elective per term, aligned to an area of personal interest. Some of these electives lead towards participation in various regional events such as: Rockquest, Showquest, Chess and the Tough Guy and Gal Challenge.

Other Learning Labs for Term one included: Rowing, Audio Engineering, Songwriting, Korean Language and Cooking, Artificial Intelligence tools, 3D Modelling and Printing, Latin American Language and Cooking, Costume Design, Pickling and Preserving using produce from the school farm, Learn the Road Code, Eeling (local history and hinaki construction), Self Defence, Rugby Skill Development, Kapa Haka, Volleyball, 3x3 Basketball, Papier Mache crafting, Leadership Development, Manicure Skills, Pedal Prix, and Movie Appreciation (see page 15 for some photos). New courses for Term two include offerings such as: Woodturning, Financial Literacy, Maths Olympiad Competitions, Debating and Crochet.

The end of Term one also saw the introduction of 'Do Days' where each class ran for double-periods over the course of a week, providing 150 minutes of uninterrupted learning time per class. Teachers have utilised this opportunity by designing a range of engaging activities normally not possible with single periods. It was great to see a number of experts from various fields coming into classrooms, sharing their experiences and running activities. Students were also able to consider the various career pathway opportunities that arose from the different experiences.

We started Term one with a sizable list of senior students keen to gain work experience via the Gateway program.

Once students completed a module in our Health and Safety program their personal strengths, career interests and abilities were discussed, many students had contacts with employers so we could sign Employment Agreements within their local communities.

Farm work experience is popular (one student was fortunate to gain practical skills on Burton's farm in Kerepehi), reversing a trailer, water blasting and painting water tanks are useful skills to attain in our Primary Industries.

Year 12 student Jared Everett has enjoyed learning the intricate details of watch repair with the Thames Jewellers, the best jeweller on the Coromandel!

An HPC "first", six students with interests in veterinary work or

the equine industry have been attending the Annarehab program at Waitakaruru. Here Mrs B and Anna, her Vet Tech daughter, rehabilitate ex-racehorses with injuries/illness and transition them into therapy horses working with varied groups of all ages. Students also learn about feeding and pasture maintenance, while sometimes helping to harrow the arena on the quad bike.

We have a First Aid Course next term and at least another 15 students starting in local trades, students look forward to their placement days with some continuing over the school holidays, we look forward to sharing future updates and extend our gratitude to the numerous employers who allow our students to gain valuable insights with industry experience.

It's been an exceptionally busy and productive start to the year. University liaison visits have proven popular with students looking to plan their degree pathways. Careers interviews have been happening for Years 11-13 as a priority, especially for those students going out on Gateway placements. This year we expect that 120 students will have some sort of Gateway experience in everything from Aviation to Veterinary. Health & Safety and First Aid courses have been booked and students allocated places depending on their needs and prior experiences. Drivers' Licence courses are also underway for learner and restricted testing. Other students looking at STAR transitions are exploring taster courses in Hairdressing, Business and Creative Media. Our academically motivated students are studying Unistart papers as appropriate to their career pathways and personal goals. International Womens' Day has been used as a focus to encourage students to consider STEM careers and explore career possibilities.

ENVIRONMENTAL COUNCIL



Kia ora Ngatea! We're Sophy Liang (pictured top left) and Hanne Vanhoovels (top right), and we are really excited to be the leaders of Hauraki Plains College's new Environmental Council.

We want to be a pillar for all matters and issues regarding sustainability, while advocating for the planet/Papatūānuku and the school value of Kaitiakitanga - looking after our place.

This term in Week 9 we undertook a waste audit here at HPC to see how much and what types of rubbish the school produced outdoors in one day. With all hands on deck (most Enviro council members, Jo from Enviroschools, Lucci from the Seagull center and four other amazing seniors volunteering and helping out), all the sorting, weighing, cleaning up and bringing of non-landfill rubbish over to the Ngatea recycling centre took around two hours.

After crunching the numbers, we have found we made a total of 53.3 kgs of rubbish (which is equivalent to the weight of 110.6 blocks of butter) with over half (at 28.8kgs) saved from landfill! As for the weight of rubbish in each category:

Soft plastics = 6.4kg, and were mostly chips and pies' packets Recyclable paper = 12.4kg Recyclable plastics = 4.4kg Organic waste = 7.3kg Aluminium = 4.2kg Glass = 1.4kg Landfill = 19.2kg

Surprisingly, there were a lot of items that we thought would be recyclable but actually weren't, like paper plates, coffee cups, tea bags and serviettes due to either being too contaminated from food, plastic coatings, the presence of glue or a resin which makes it absorb liquid better. There were some rather strange things we found chucked into the bins as well, including two whole novels, a pair of old shoe insoles and part of a tyre. All in all, this audit was a pretty eye-opening adventure, and a top tip we can give is to not only abide by the age old mantra of 'reduce, reuse and recycle', but to also rethink/repurpose things you might consider as rubbish (if the novels are already damaged, why not tear the intact pages out to use as origami paper for some sweet decor?).

Te Reo Māori Programme

In the words of Sir Doctor Tīmoti Kāretu (pictured right), a dedicated te reo Māori advocate and revitalist, "Te iti kei a koe, puāwaitia. Te nui kei a koe whāngaihia." The key message from this quote is to nurture whatever knowledge one possesses, whether little or abundant. This philosophy underpins all the reo Māori programmes at Hauraki Plains College, built on the foundational understanding that we treat the classroom as a familial 'whare' where respect and empowerment are prioritized in order to foster 'good learning.'

Year 9 and 10 students have been focusing on foundational language skills, such as pronunciation, grammar and basic sentence structure, and how to apply those in conversation. The junior students have then taken all their learning and demonstrated it in the form of a 1-2min visual-oral presentation about themselves and their whānau completely in te reo Māori.

In Year 12 and 13, the students have delved into higher-level learning at a more intense pace

to prepare for assignments and exams in the coming school terms. Seniors have learnt to apply their knowledge practically, including translation, sentence construction, and engaging with te reo Māori media to progress all of their language comprehension skills: Listening, Reading, Viewing, Spoken, Written and Demonstrative.

Te Whare Toka Tū Moana (Māori Department), with Matua Normie Anderson at the head, are working together to lift the profile of Māori language and cultural learning subjects here at Hauraki Plains College, which has begun with a compulsory exam for all seniors te reo Māori students, to return a greater mana to the language within our school. This is being demonstrated through our 100% passing rate to date across all year levels.

The Science Department has had a roaring start to the year. Our new Year 9 cohort have been learning essential laboratory skills like lighting a bunsen burner, using scientific apparatus and investigating techniques to separate a variety of mixtures.

Term one highlights for other year levels include Ms Clelland's Year 10 class learning about forces, propelling balloon rockets across the classroom and constructing rubber band powered cars, to learn about friction and motion of objects.

Ms Isbister's Year 12 Biology classes enjoyed returning to Pauanui as the destination of choice for the annual Rocky Shore field trip. Students enjoyed the perfect conditions as they collected data on the organisms that inhabit the rocky shore. They will use this data to determine the community pattern and explain how the organisms have adapted to their own specific environment.

Mr Angell's Year 13 Chemistry class has learned about batteries and how they are able to produce electricity. They learned how to electroplate through electrolysis, a process where energy is supplied to a solution that allows precious metals to coat other less precious metals. Year 12 Chemistry students have learned how chemical reactions can lead to movement of electrons and how they can recognize the indicators of those reactions.

Congratulations to Jaskeerat Randhawa for being one of just 25 students selected from throughout Aotearoa to attend the New Zealand international Biology Olympiad camp to be held in Auckland in April. The four strong New Zealand team to travel to the 35th Olympiad in Astana, Kazakhstan in July will be selected at this camp. Top photo shows Jaskeerat practising his dissection skills.

It has been great to see our students thinking scientifically and growing in confidence and knowledge across all their Science learning. We look forward to bringing them more opportunities to learn how they can apply their scientific knowledge across a variety of occupations.

Drama is available for Years 9 through to 13! Our enthusiastic Year 9s have devised mimed music videos and are exploring the language and choreographed stage fighting with Shakespeare. Year 10's have been looking at themes of migration and movement using the text 'The Arrival' by Shaun Tan. Students have created scenes based on the text, and their own interpretation around the journey of moving to a completely new place. Year 11 Performing Arts polished their acting and dancing skills ready for their first performance of 'Irish Annals of Aotearoa' that took place on the 4th April. Year 12 and 13's wowed their audiences by performing a modern take of Shakespeare's 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' on the 9th April.

Dance can be picked in Years 10-13. Year 12 and 13's are choreographing solos, duos and small group dances to perform at the upcoming Mahurangi Exchange and DanceNZmade.

Showquest is on the 21st of May in Hamilton, and has a huge uptake of over 60 dancers and crew this year. Year 12 and 13 dance captains are busy choreographing a moving 10min performance around their chosen theme of 'The 5 Stages of Grief'. Tickets on sale soon!

Music has upwards of 150 students in itinerant music lessons playing Guitar, Bass, Drums, Vocals, Piano, Trumpet, Trombone and Saxophone. Groups in Guitar Ensemble, Jazz Band, Choir and student led bands. In Term two we will look to start a junior band programme. Students are writing songs and practising for RockQuest and our upcoming concert in Term two, One Autumn's Night. All are welcome to come and support us on Thursday 2nd of May.

Our Year 9 art students are designing and printing posters to protest against contemporary issues. The Year 11 students are creating landscapes focusing on "Nga Taonga", our treasures.

BUSINESS STUDIES
